Request for Cooperation on Questionnaire for Foreign Residents

### Purpose of Survey

The Legal Affairs Bureaus and District Legal Affairs Bureaus around the country under the Ministry of Justice Human Rights organs conduct various day-to-day educational activities and respond to human rights-related consultations in order to overcome prejudice and discrimination against foreigners.

In order to further enhance such efforts, this survey is being carried out to ask foreigners living in Japan about their experiences of discrimination and prejudice, and about related government measures.

Foreigners who live in Japan include some who are temporarily living in Japan to study or to work, as well as those who were born and raised in Japan and want to continue living in Japan in the future, and people with a variety of other circumstances, and this survey aims to examine how people in these various circumstances feel about discrimination and prejudice in Japan. The survey questions may include items which seem irrelevant to you, but we ask for your cooperation in completing this survey in the spirit described above.

#### oHow to Respond

Inside the envelope are questionnaires in Japanese and English, and the language you are believed to use, so please select the language which is easiest for you, and fill in that questionnaire with your responses. Please enclose <u>the questionnaire you have filled out only</u> in the enclosed return envelope, and post it no later than <u>Monday</u>, <u>December 5</u>. There is no need to affix a stamp.

### About the Center for Human Rights Education and Training

This survey has been commissioned by the Human Rights Bureau of the Ministry of Justice to the Center for Human Rights Education and Training (hereinafter "Center for Human Rights"). The Center for Human Rights carries out comprehensive education, training and promotional activities, as well as surveys, research and other operations. And it has been commissioned for many years by the Ministry of Justice to create teaching materials and to

conduct surveys and research on human rights.

## oBackground to Sending this Questionnaire and the Handling of Personal Information

The human rights organs of the Ministry of Justice and the Center for Human Rights do not know the names or addresses and other information of foreign residents. Therefore, with the cooperation of local governments with a relatively large population of foreign residents, approximately 500 names per local government entity have been extracted at random from amongst the information managed by said local governments on foreign residents 18 years or over (as of September 30, 2016), and questionnaires have been mailed to these foreign residents.

This questionnaire has arrived at your address because you were selected at random from resident information with the cooperation of the local government in which you live, and we now ask for your cooperation in completing this survey. The process of mailing out this questionnaire has been completed by the local government entity, and none of your personal information, including your name and address, has been shared with the Center for Human Rights or the Ministry of Justice. In addition, the information extracted by the local government entity will not be used for any other purpose than for the mailing of these questionnaires.

The returned responses will be processed by the Center for Human Rights, but given that responses are anonymous, it will be impossible to identify any individuals. You will be asked for your personal information such as gender, age and nationality, but this information will only be used to the extent necessary to the analysis of the survey results. Please have confidence in responding to questions that your responses will be managed at the responsibility of the Center for Human Rights, and after being processed they will be promptly destroyed.

The aggregated results of this survey are expected to be published in order to widely disperse information about foreigner human rights issues, but no individual responses will be published, and no information will be published which allows the identification of specific individuals. In addition, data will also be provided to each local government entity to be utilized in the provision of measures within each such entity.


